#### Thought for the week



This week I have been preparing to contribute a short talk at the Creation Care Conference in Newry on 17<sup>th</sup> January - outline at the back of the Announcements. The morning session has high-profile speakers on eco-theology, agricultural research, reconciliation ecology and government. In the afternoon, four of us 'ordinary folk' who work on the ground for climate action by faith communities will share our experiences. I took the topic of volunteering because I felt it was worth exploring the challenges it presents.

I have enjoyed the voluntary work I have been allowed to do for climate action in MCC in the past two years. It is encouraging to see that the combination of the efforts of the volunteers in the Refurbishment Group and what I have been able to add on by getting state grants has led to a significant reduction in emissions from gas usage, and cost reductions also.

In thinking about the subject of volunteering, I was keen to explore more about the dedicated work by congregation members in the past. I had fascinating conversations about the various eras since the burning of the church in 1968, the move to Leeson Park, the effects of the financial crash, the strategic approaches needed to secure funds for preservation of the buildings. Those conversations also led me to wonder how we can sustain volunteering for the challenges of the future. One of several devoted leaders in the move to Leeson Park was 35 years old and had three children at home when the church burned



down. We would not want young parents nowadays to take on such all-consuming work. Nor would we expect their partners to carry all the family responsibility.

Thankfully, there are now ways to contribute that are not so disruptive to personal life. We may hate Zoom meetings but they allow people to attend with the camera off as they put their children to bed. It is a delight to see a two-year old arriving on a cargo bike with a parent getting things done at Wesley House. (We need better parking for cargo bikes – that's another project). What matters in the future, I feel, is flexibility in allowing talent and energy to flow through new channels, not always through the structures and committees that served us well in the past. In Corinthians 1:12 we read:

*"There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit distributes them. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but in all of them and in everyone it is the same God at work."*

### Tax Back Tax Relief Scheme

A taxpayer who contributes €250 to the church in a year enables the church to recover €112.82 from the Revenue Commissioners thereby increasing the donation to €362.82, and pro rata for donations of over €250. This scheme brought in over €17,000 last year. To register, you need a CHY3 form from Lynne Pasley. This latter is valid for 5 years and doesn't commit you to make any future donations.
